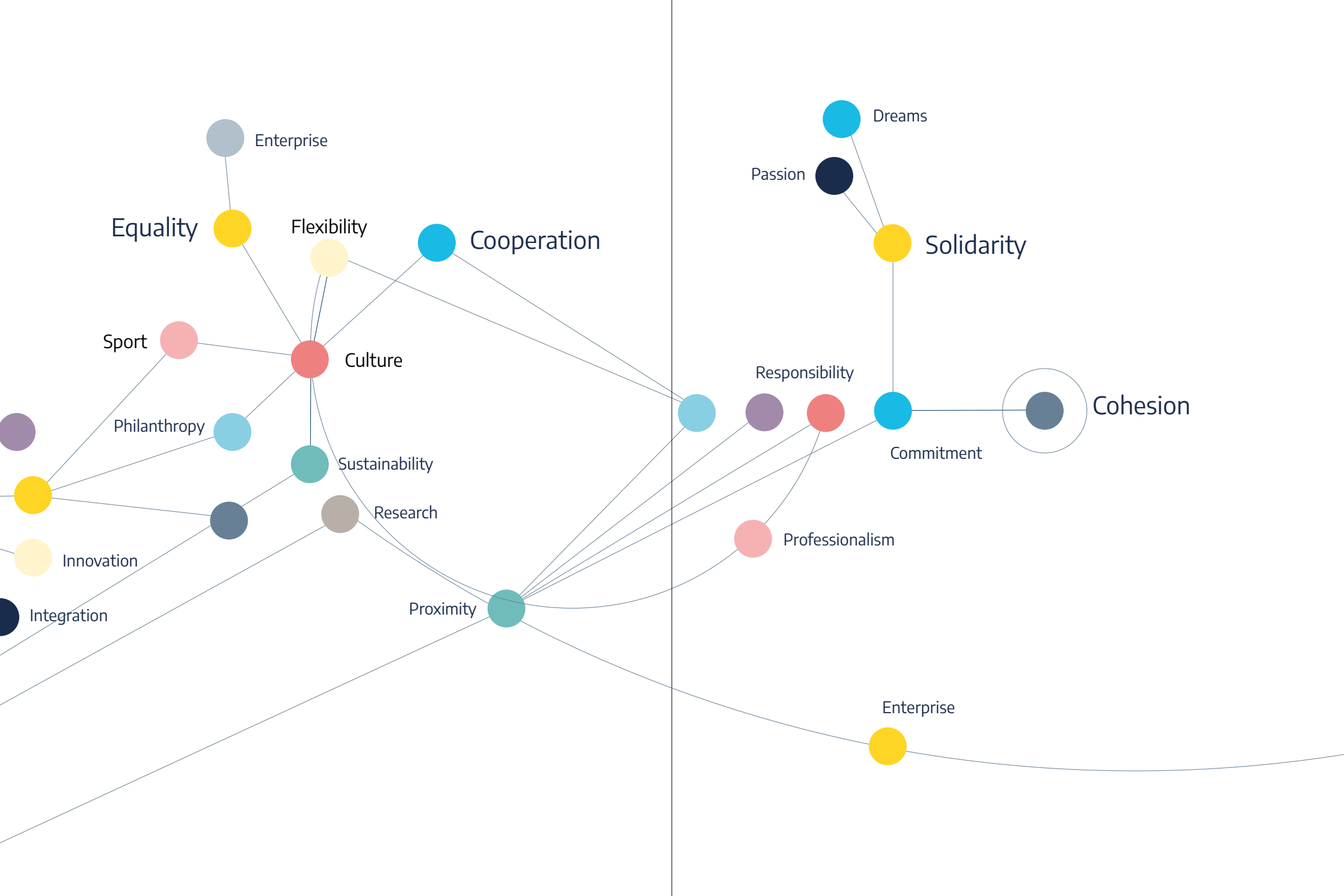

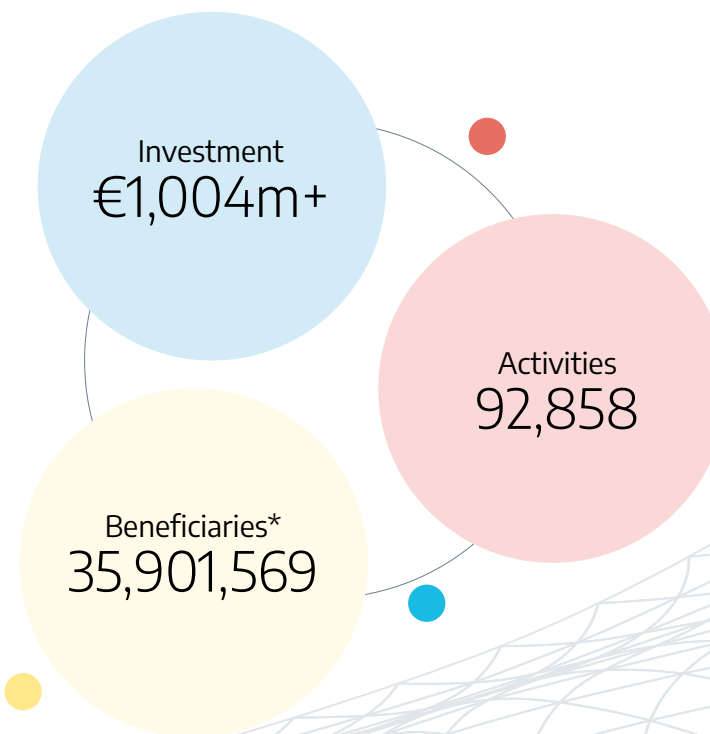

The Obra Social of the CECA Foundations is the leading private social investor in Spain.



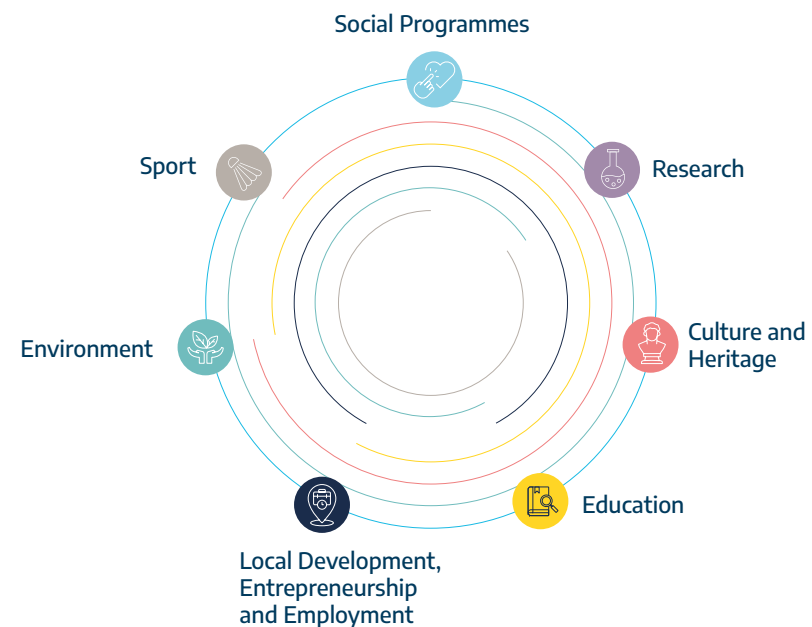

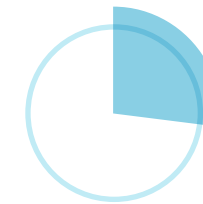

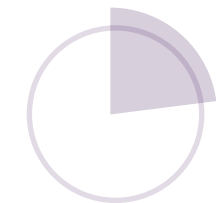

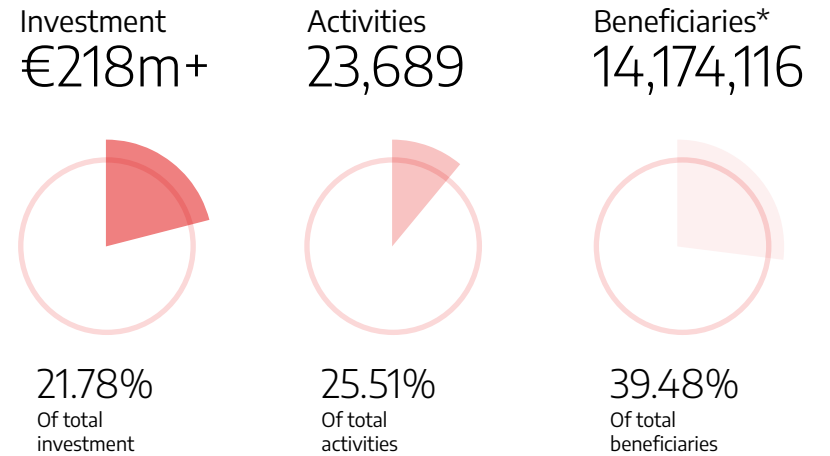

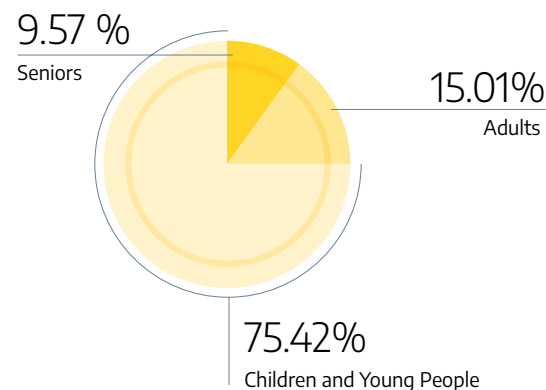

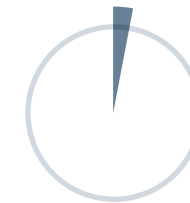

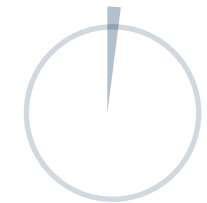

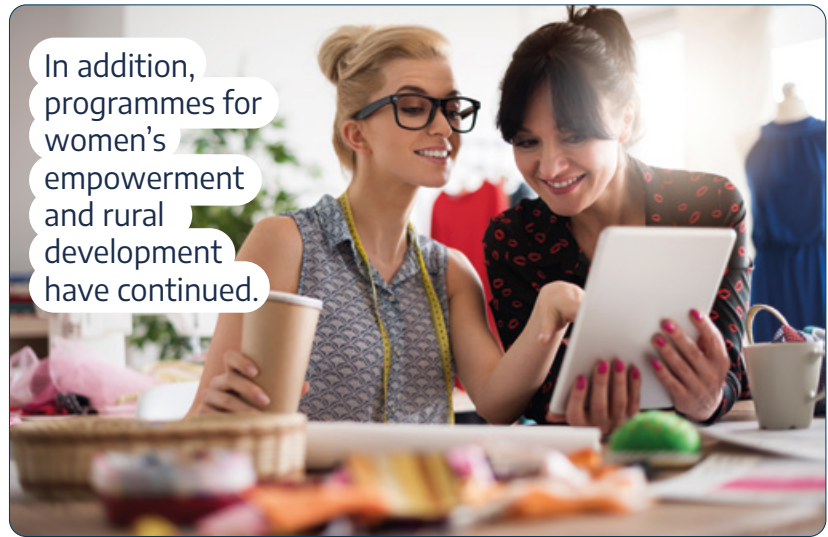

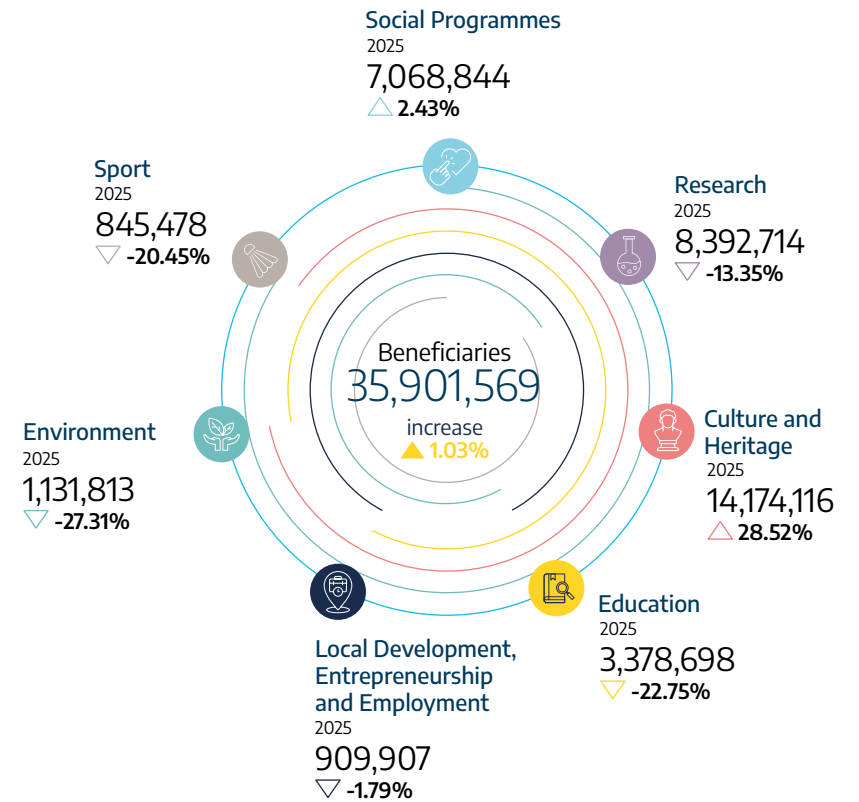

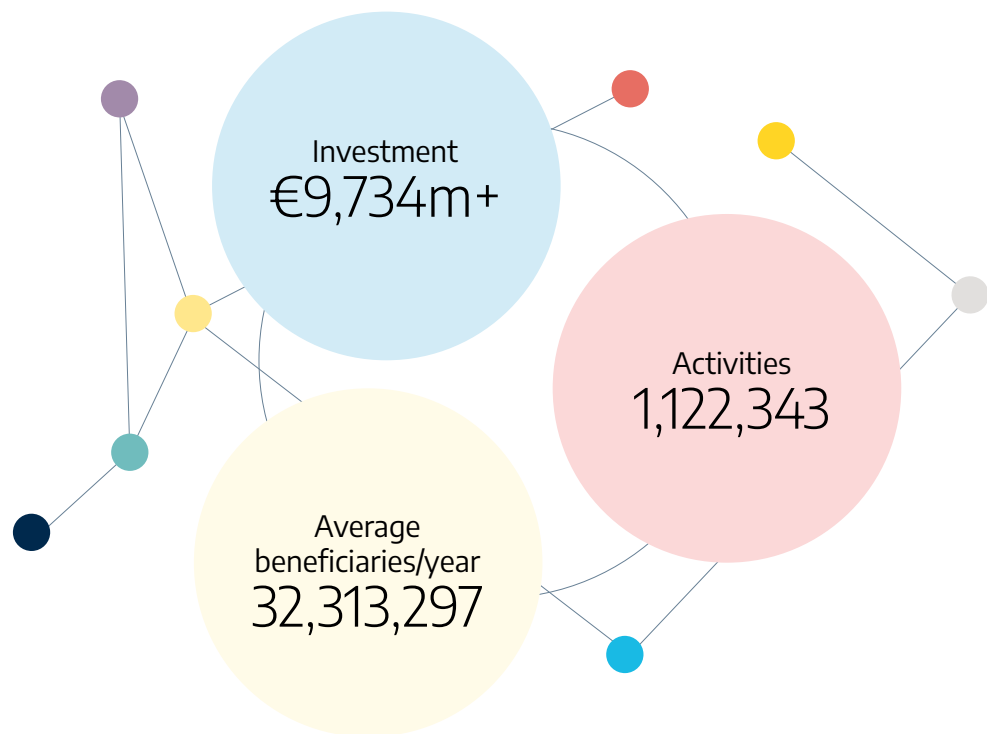

## Trend in the Obra Social of the CECA Foundations

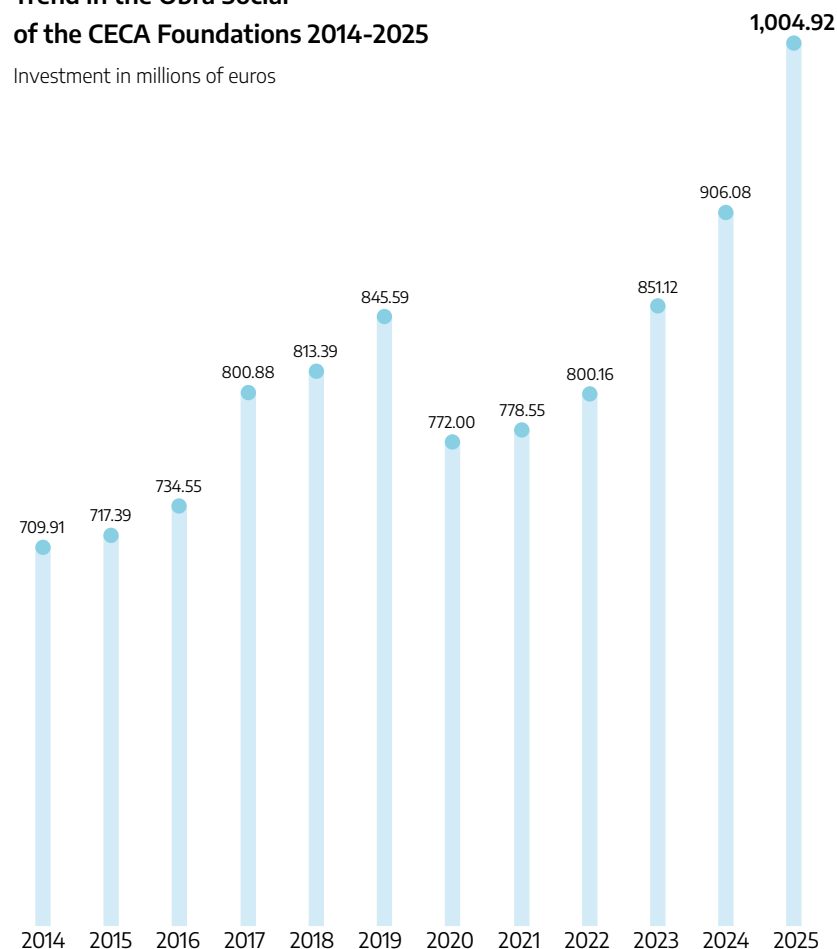
Following the publication of the Savings Banks Law, the cumulative data over these twelve years are as follows:

### 3.1. From strengths to impact: the response of the Obra Social of the CECA Foundations to social and environmental challenges



During 2025, an **exercise to measure the economic, social and environmental impact** of the Obra Social of the CECA foundations was carried out. This work began with the **identification of the social and environmental challenges** addressed by the Obra Social, and extended to the **definition of the impacts** it generates, as well as **development of indicators** that have made it possible to quantify them, with the aim of guiding decision-making and maximising value creation in terms of impact.

Within the framework of this report, the identification of **the main social and environmental challenges in Spain to which the Obra Social of the CECA Foundations responds is set out below**. Through our seven areas of activity, we address **22 of the country's most relevant challenges**, demonstrating the **scope and direction of our social action**, which seeks to provide a response to some of the **most significant** needs of Spanish society.

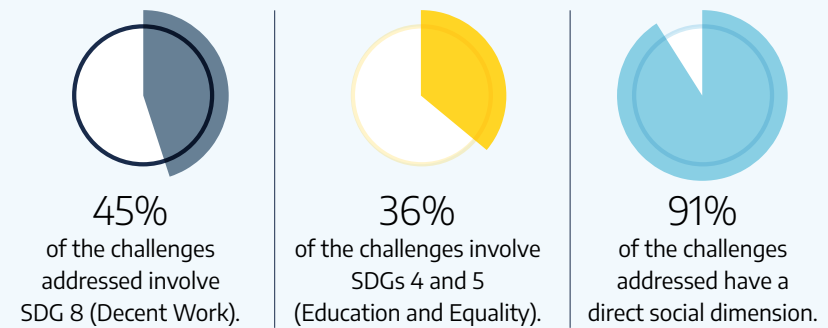


# 04 Conclusions

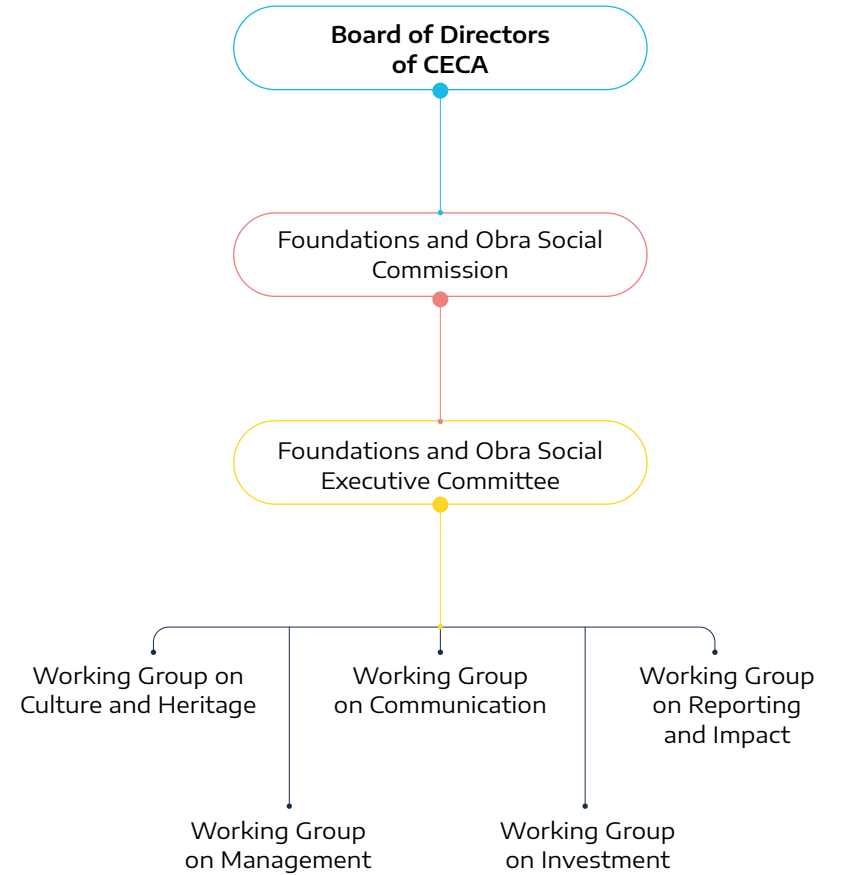
- Since the approval of Law 26/2013 of 27 December, investment in Obra Social has recorded a cumulative increase of 42%, reaffirming the role of CECA's associated entities as **key actors in the social sphere**.
- One of the main milestones achieved in 2025 was the notable increase in investment in the Obra Social of the CECA foundations, which **grew by 10.91% compared to the previous year**, consolidating its position as the **leading private social investor in Spain**, with investment exceeding **€1 billion and more than 92,000 activities carried out**.
- The **Social Programmes** area continued to account for the **largest share of both investment and number of activities**, highlighting the strong commitment of CECA's associated entities to social development and the reduction of inequalities. This area recorded investment of over **€362 million and more than 34,000 activities**.
- In 2025, the **Research** area was consolidated as the **third area with the highest investment, number of activities and number of beneficiaries**, reinforcing its relevance within the overall social action carried out.
- The **Culture and Heritage** area was the one that reached the **highest number of beneficiaries**, with more than **14 million, representing 39.48% of the total**, significantly exceeding the figure recorded in 2024 (11 million). It also cemented its position as the **second area with the highest investment**, accounting for **21.78% of the total**.

- The **Education** area increased its investment compared to 2024, rising from **€95 million to over €97 million** in 2025.
- The area of **Local Development, Entrepreneurship and Employment** was the **third highest in terms of investment growth**, increasing from **€87 million in 2024 to over €120 million in 2025**.
- The **Environment** and **Sport** areas recorded the **highest growth in investment** compared to the previous year. In particular, the **Environment** area also stood out for the significant increase in the number of activities carried out, which rose from **more than 3,000 in 2024 to 7,000 in 2025**.

According to the analysis carried out, the challenges addressed by the Obra Social of the CECA foundations respond to all 17 United Nations Sustainable Development.



# 05 Sector Activity in 2025



## 5.1. Foundations and Obra Social Commission



The Obra Social and Foundations Commission is a statutory and consultative body and main forum that brings together the representatives and managers of the member foundations for the exchange of experiences, cooperation, and analysis in the field of Obra Social.



## 5.2. Foundations and Obra Social Executive Committee

The Executive Committee of Obra Social and Foundations provides a forum for dialogue and coordination between foundations and the institutions that engage in Obra Social. A range of topics are addressed in its meetings, including the importance of strategic partnerships, new technologies, the exploration of new funding avenues, impact measurement, as well as other general matters related to the management of foundations. In addition, the creation of various Working Groups is promoted in order to examine each of these areas in greater depth.

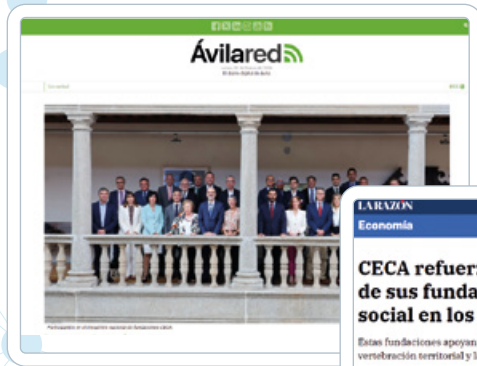

## 6.1. CECA Obra Social and Financial Education Awards



On 17 December 2025, CECA held the 20th edition of the CECA Awards for Obra Social and Financial Education at the Real Casino de Madrid, in collaboration with El Confidencial. The aim of the awards is to recognise and highlight projects that generate a positive and measurable impact within communities.

The event was opened by Soledad Núñez, Deputy Governor of the Bank of Spain, and Antonio Romero, Director General of CECA. In this edition, a total of 74 projects were submitted, of which 53 corresponded to the field of Obra Social and 21 to Financial Education, with the participation of 25 institutions and foundations associated with CECA.

In total, 22 initiatives were recognised, in addition to two special jury awards and one international award, all distinguished for their social impact, transformative capacity and contribution to societal well-being.

At international level, the award was granted to Caja Huancayo, a Peruvian financial institution, in recognition of its commitment to sustainable development and financial innovation.

The event was closed by Rafael Barbero, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Obra Social and Foundations and Director of Fundación Caja de Burgos, and Nacho Cardero, Director of El Confidencial.

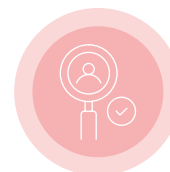
### 7.1. Presence in international forums



CECA is present in multiple forums, where it works to disseminate and promote the activity of Obra Social from the sector's perspective.

As an example of this, CECA is a member of international associations representing the retail banking model, such as WSBI (World Savings and Retail Banking Institute) and ESBG (European Savings and Retail Banking Group), in which **6,400 savings banks and retail banks participate worldwide, serving 1.7 billion clients across more than 78 countries.**

Thanks to the development of a varied, inclusive and travelling programme, Afundación reaffirmed its position in 2025 as the leading Galician foundation, both in terms of the quality, quantity and diversity of its activities and its reach, exceeding 1.4 million beneficiaries. Particularly noteworthy, due to its multidisciplinary nature, is “ftaca”, an interactive exhibition space for financial education which combines technological innovation and storytelling inspired by the Odyssey. It enables participants—more than 6,500—to acquire skills in a dynamic way and become familiar with responsible personal financial management.

At the same time, Afundación strengthened its presence across Spain and also reached Portugal through projects ranging from exhibitions on environmental themes and new forms of visual expression to emotional health programmes for older people, training and knowledge-promotion initiatives, social inclusion projects, and volunteering and sustainability activities.

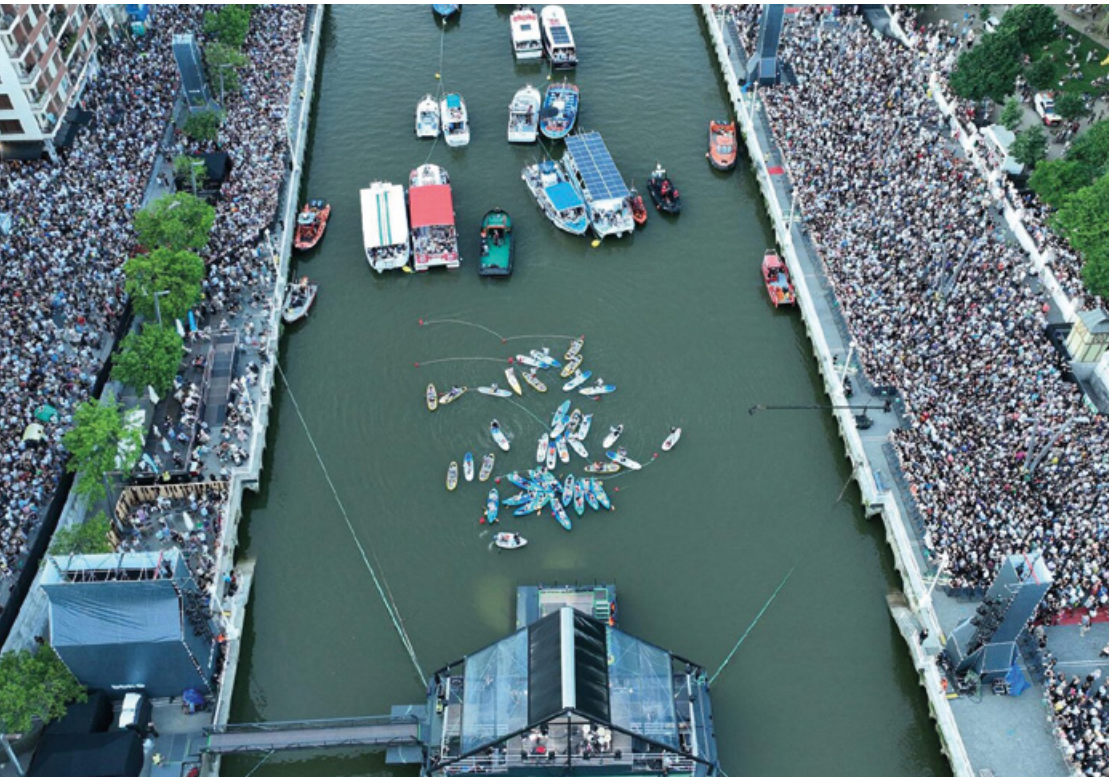
**2026 GOALS**

In collaboration with the Madrid City Council, “Art and Mercy. The Holy Charity of Seville” will be presented, a selection of jewels from the Sevillian Baroque school. Meanwhile, the Afundación Art Collection will feature in a monographic exhibition at the Municipal Museum of Contemporary Art of Madrid.

The “Territorial Conservation Plan-ON” (PLANCTON) will exceed 150 tonnes of waste removed in 2026, thanks to more than 4,600 volunteers. The “Fire Prevention Action Plan” will enter the reforestation phase, following forest mulching and ash containment.

“Digital Equality” is Afundación’s response to digital divides among the older population, structured around a free training platform on its online channel and in-person training activities.

In 2026, Afundación will strengthen its territorial reach through the development of its financial education, values, and sustainability programmes, with more than 320,000 school pupils participating across Spain.

## 2025 Main Milestones

In 2025, BBK marked its 10th anniversary as a banking foundation with outstanding results across all areas. In Culture, there were more than 2.5 million visits/participants, with Sala BBK exceeding 56,600 attendees and BBK RIA bringing together 35,000 people along the Bilbao estuary. In People, the number of beneficiaries exceeded 400,000, with projects such as Bizkaia Gara (85,500 people) and the launch of BBK Topa and BBK Familiak. In Prosperity, 28 social start-ups were supported, 141 people were trained through digital bootcamps, and the BBK Enplegu Inklusiboa programme facilitated 43 job placements. In Planet, more than 200,000 people took part in environmental programmes; BBK Klima Abentura recorded 8,798 visits and 4,068 trees were planted through BBK Basoa. The total budget grew by more than 25%, reaching €47.6 million allocated to Obra Social in Bizkaia.

## 2026 GOALS

For 2026, BBK aims to advance across four areas.

In Culture, it will consolidate Sala BBK as a national benchmark for performing arts, with a new season of in-house productions and programming in Basque.

In People, it will continue BBK Familiak and BBK Topa, expanding their intergenerational reach, and will keep promoting the labour market integration of vulnerable groups.

In Prosperity, it will begin the clinical trial of the BB-NK-001 drug for acute myeloid leukaemia (subject to prior approval by

the Spanish Agency of Medicines and Medical Devices), continue digital bootcamps focused on employability, and hold new editions of BBK Ekin and BBK Arin for social entrepreneurship.

In Planet, it will complete the renovation of the BBK Urdaibai Centre (scheduled for June), officially launch BBK Klima Eskolak, and migrate BBK Azoka to a new technological platform.

Across all areas, it will develop the Impact Management Procedure and implement the internal control strengthening measures identified in 2025.

In the past financial year, Fundación CajaCanarias opened one of its most ambitious exhibitions: Sombras y poemas, by the internationally renowned artist Jaume Plensa. The exhibition, which remains open in 2026, brings together nearly one hundred works offering a broad overview of the Barcelona-based sculptor's career, from his early creations in the 1990s to his most recent productions.

With this exhibition, Fundación CajaCanarias reaffirms its commitment to showcasing projects of major artistic significance, as well as its aim of bringing cultural experiences to the public that combine innovation, rigour and quality. Sombras y poemas therefore forms part of the organisation's programme to promote access to contemporary art, encourage critical thinking and contribute to the cultural enrichment of society in the Canary Islands.

**2026 GOALS**

The 2026 action plan maintains the main lines of activity and initiatives consolidated in recent years, while also including significant cultural events and initiatives, such as the launch of the Espacio de las Identidades Canarias, a project aimed at highlighting Canarian heritage through research, creativity, conservation, training and dissemination; social initiatives, including a programme to address homelessness; sports initiatives, through the launch of a call for

proposals for sports projects; and educational initiatives, such as the creation of early years school workshops Creciendo con Música, among others.

In addition, within the range of activities offered to the public, new spaces are expected to be launched in different municipalities across the archipelago over the current and coming year.

Under the title “Cultivating lifestyle, transforming the mind”, Fundación Caja de Burgos developed an innovative programme to address mental health from a social, cultural and scientific perspective, beyond the clinical sphere. The project arose from the need to combat the stigma, ignorance and euphemisms surrounding mental illness—factors that lead to marginalisation and a lack of resources for those affected and their families. Under the scientific direction of the psychiatrist Jesús de la Gándara, emeritus member of the Spanish College of Psychiatry, the programme addressed, between October and November, various factors affecting mental health, ranging from nutrition and rest to physical exercise, work, family relationships and the consumption of content via social media, among many other issues.

Lectures, dialogues and talks by a wide range of experts, video podcasts, film screenings, exhibitions, theatre performances and music concerts, as well as experiential outings, workshops and training courses, made up a programme of more than 100 initiatives, offering a multifaceted perspective on the reality of mental disorders. In short, it constituted a comprehensive initiative exploring the relationship between lifestyle and mental health, based on up-to-date knowledge, clinical experience and philosophical reflection.

The work of Fundación Ibercaja is mainly carried out across four areas of activity: Social commitment, Culture, Regional development, and Professional development. All of them share the organisation's overarching purpose: to support people by promoting their personal and professional development.

**2025 Main Milestones**

In the area of social action, a total of four calls have been launched: the annual call for social projects, one focused on support for children, and others relating to the environment, international cooperation and support for the digitisation of the third sector. As a new initiative, the first Fundación Ibercaja Charity Gala was held in Teruel.

In culture, major exhibitions have continued, such as the exhibition dedicated to Eduardo Chillida at La Lonja in Zaragoza, as well as one organised in collaboration with the National Archaeological Museum (MAN) and the Louvre Museum on Iberian sculpture, and another featuring Isabel Guerra. In March, a major concert by Plácido Domingo took place at the Basilica del Pilar, and successful series such as "Martes de libros" have continued.

In education and entrepreneurship, one of the main new developments has been the expansion of the territories where the "Aprendiendo a emprender" programme is delivered, aimed at fostering entrepreneurship from school age. The financial education programme has also continued, and the IAON initiative, focused on artificial intelligence, has been launched in collaboration with Microsoft and Ibercaja Banco.

At Mobility City, a new edition of the Sustainable Mobility Innovation Awards took place, along with the exhibition "Opel Love", focusing on the historical relationship between the German brand, Zaragoza and Aragón.

**2026 GOALS**

The year 2026 is particularly significant for Fundación Ibercaja, marking its 150th anniversary. Among the many activities planned, there are three major milestones:

The reopening of the Goya Museum. Following the extension works, Fundación Ibercaja will hold a major reopening event highlighting its new façade and entrance from Plaza del Pilar, along with a major inaugural exhibition bringing together works by the most universal Aragonese artist that have never before been shown together.

Leading teachers. This initiative seeks to recognise and highlight the country's best teachers and their distinctive proposals that set a benchmark for excellence. The grants are awarded under the honorary presidency of H.R.H. Infanta Doña Sofía.

"The World to Come" Conference. Over two days in June, internationally renowned speakers will gather in Zaragoza to discuss the major challenges of today.

The flagship milestone of 2025 was the Extraordinary Call for Grants, with a budget of €3 million specifically aimed at projects developed in partnership between organisations in the region. An innovative approach that rewards collaboration as a driver of social transformation in Gipuzkoa.

In culture, the 25th anniversary of Sala Kubo shaped the year's exhibition programme: 12 exhibitions, one jointly organised with TBK, and a major exhibition by Maider López, the most comprehensive devoted to her work to date.

In the fields of science and education, Kutxa Fundazioa took part in the 9th edition of Emakumeak Zientzian, a collective project involving 35 Basque organisations and featuring more than 60 activities aimed at showcasing women in science, breaking stereotypes and fostering STEM vocations among new generations.

**2026 GOALS**

In 2026, eleven new exhibitions will be promoted, continuing to bring art and culture closer to all citizens of Gipuzkoa. In addition, the performing arts space Kutxa Fundazioa Kluba will celebrate its tenth anniversary, a milestone marked by a more ambitious, diverse and innovative programme than ever.

But the outlook extends far beyond culture. Hitzetatik Ekintzetara will continue to be promoted, strengthening collaboration among territorial stakeholders to build collective responses to Gipuzkoa's major challenges. The Naturan Hezi programme will continue to bring nature closer to

children and families as a privileged space for learning, connection and care. Entrepreneurship will be supported through Sorlekua, and emerging musical talent will be accompanied through the Katapulta Tour programme.

Grant schemes, with a particular emphasis on projects developed in partnership, will remain a key tool for generating real and lasting impact across the territory. All of this is guided by a shared purpose: to contribute to a more just, cultured, creative and sustainable Gipuzkoa.

Building a better and fairer society by offering more opportunities to those who need them most. The activity is structured around three main pillars: Social sphere – Research and Grants sphere – Cultural sphere.

CaixaProinfancia, to combat child poverty; Incorpora, aimed at promoting employment among vulnerable groups; the Comprehensive Care Programme for People with Advanced Illnesses, focused on providing psychological and emotional support at the end of life; and the Older People Programme, which strengthens social ties, reduces loneliness and provides support. In addition to its strategic social programmes, Fundación "la Caixa" supports research through collaboration with leading centres and awards grants to foster talent. The dissemination of culture, science and knowledge has also been a key area of activity.

**2026 GOALS**

Combating poverty and exclusion is the organisation's primary objective.

One of our social programmes is CaixaProinfancia, aimed at vulnerable families with minors. We will also work closely with the entities of the Incorpora programme to facilitate access to employment for people at risk of social exclusion; we will maintain psychological and emotional support for people with advanced illnesses and their families, and strengthen social ties, reducing loneliness through the Older People programme.

This is complemented by support for research aimed at combating the most serious and widespread diseases, the awarding of grants and the dissemination of culture, science and knowledge, conceived as a driver of social.

This translates into an annual budget of 710 million euros.

Likewise, its role in promoting CITAC, a leading centre in cancer research, stands out.

In addition, once again, it has developed its Campus programme, a leisure, training and sport initiative that benefited nearly 7,000 young people.

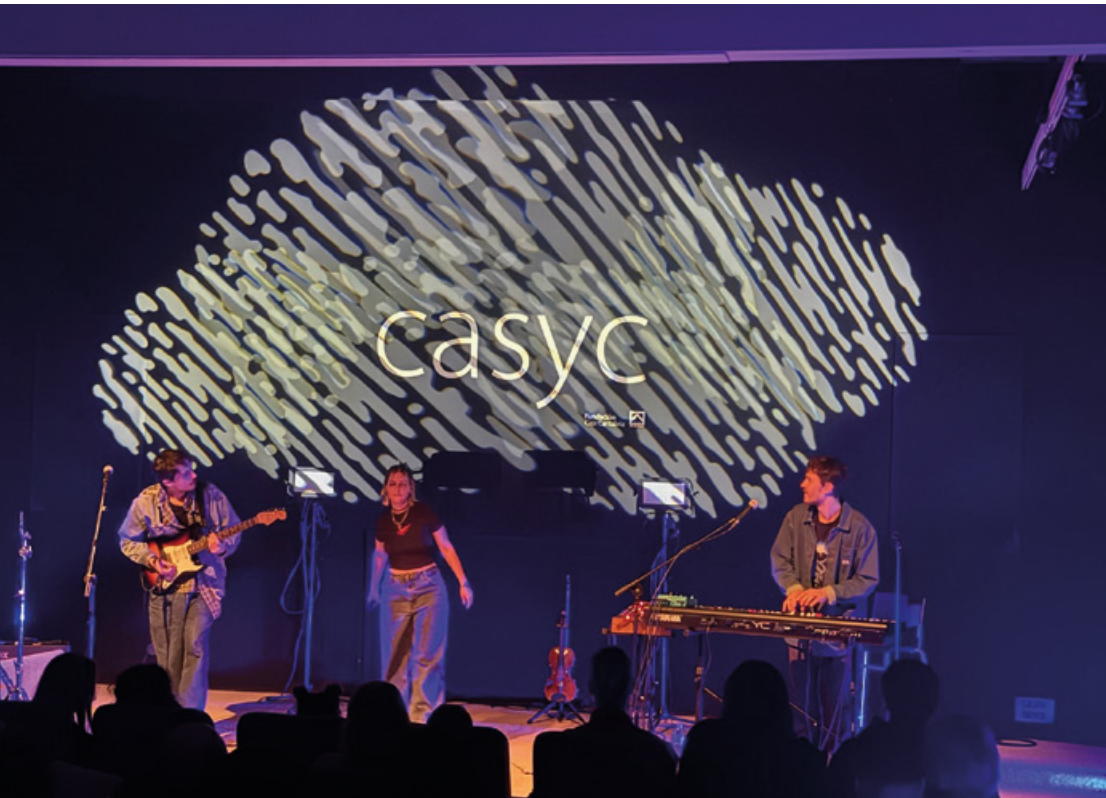
The cultural programme included first-class exhibitions, such as the one dedicated to the House of Alba collection, with all proceeds allocated entirely to social causes. The terrace of the Cádiz Cultural Centre was also inaugurated, expanding its offer with high-quality proposals aligned with the Foundation's identity and social commitment.

**2026 GOALS**

The strengthening of ESG (Environmental, Social and Governance) criteria, territorial balance, the sustainability of core social action, support for financial education, the promotion of research and the drive for environmental conservation initiatives will remain strategic pillars. This is complemented by the promotion of talent and the strengthening of volunteering, together with the creation and consolidation of new tools such as LiveUpp, a property development company created to support a new line of social activity based on investment in the development and rental of social housing (VPO).

Likewise, addressing the most pressing social needs will remain a priority, fostering equity, equal opportunities and social inclusion.

Support for the emerging and entrepreneurial economy will also be reinforced through Fundalogy, an in-house entity designed to promote innovative initiatives, while ensuring the proper management of our financial stake in Unicaja.

In the cultural field, the consolidation of the CASYC PHOTO project as a reference in visual culture in Cantabria and the collaboration with the Fundación Amigos del Museo del Prado in Santillana del Mar stand out.

**2026 GOALS**

2026 marks the beginning of a period of growth for the Foundation, which is increasingly aware that in a highly complex social environment such as the present one, collaboration with different social actors is essential for the development of projects. In this regard, its role in fostering collaborative environments with the main institutions of Cantabria takes on particular significance: educational

institutions such as the International University Menéndez Pelayo and the University of Cantabria; administrative bodies such as the Government of Cantabria and the City Councils of Santander and Torrelavega; healthcare institutions such as the Marqués de Valdecilla University Hospital; and social organisations such as CERMI Cantabria and COCEMFE Cantabria.

**Singular is Plural. 10th Anniversary of Obra Abierta.** A cultural initiative marking the ten-year anniversary of the Obra Abierta International Visual Arts Prize, one of the most prominent contemporary art competitions.

The commemorative programme included the presentation of the 10th edition of the award, institutional participation in ARCO Madrid, the organisation of round tables on the current artistic context, and the exhibition Singular es Plural, curated by Francisco Carpio and presented at the Ateneo de Madrid.

The exhibition brings together twelve works by artists who have taken part in different editions of the prize, offering a representative overview of the diversity of artistic languages, techniques and discourses.

This anniversary has highlighted the combination of creation, dissemination and training within the Foundation's cultural programmes from Extremadura, as well as its strong commitment to promoting culture in all its forms.

**2026 GOALS**

The activity is structured around four new areas of work:

In the **Social** area, initiatives are promoted that contribute to improving quality of life in the region, with particular attention to mental health, social innovation and the strengthening of the third sector, fostering collaboration between organisations and addressing social challenges.

**Culture** promotes artistic training and artistic creation, along with the dissemination of heritage and access to culture, understood as a driver of development and cohesion.

In **Talent**, the professionalisation and support of individuals and organisations are promoted, with the development of STEM vocations and skills as key drivers for the region's development.

In **Science**, initiatives are promoted that support research talent, strengthen the scientific ecosystem and help showcase work linked to Extremadura.

In 2025, we continued with projects aimed at training the best professionals and entrepreneurs in gastronomy, providing a service based on excellence and innovation. The main goal is to contribute to improving the education and employability of the Canary Islands' population, particularly targeting groups at risk of social exclusion, especially long-term unemployed individuals in need of retraining. The project implemented was called "Itinerario Empleo". Lasting 12 months, an IPE (Personalised Employment Itinerary) was drawn up, which included internships. The goal is to achieve a 60% job placement rate for the programme's 100 beneficiaries, using culinary techniques such as fusion, etc. In November 2026, we will launch a 5th project in this vein, with "Empleo Now" content.

**2026 GOALS**

Fundación La Caja de Canarias aims to consolidate and expand its commitment to the most disadvantaged social groups and those at risk of social exclusion; deepen local development actions in the primary sector and environmental field initiated in 2018, with a particular focus on women; and support local cultural initiatives in collaboration with private and public entities, delivering training cycles with professional certification in areas related

to labour market integration (disability, students with special educational needs, promotion of equality, administrative activities, etc.), in cooperation with private training schools and public funding.

The Foundation continues its commitment to training and employment integration in the coming months through the "EMPLEO NOW" project.

On the occasion of the 1,200th anniversary of the founding of the city of Murcia, Fundación Cajamurcia has promoted numerous initiatives such as lecture series, exhibitions, musical performances, and the lyrical productions of the prestigious Carroza del Teatro Real, which visited the city for the first time, as well as the publication of the book *Cosas dignas de memoria*. This commemorative edition, consisting of two volumes and coordinated by Professors Cristóbal Belda Navarro and Juan Hernández Franco, includes articles written by experts in art history and the history of Murcia, as well as photographs taken specifically for the occasion, alongside images from archives, museums and other regional and national institutions. The work introduces new lines of knowledge, with previously unpublished data on ancient Mesozoic times and early civilisations, as well as on the period from early Christianity to the convent-based city model around the Cathedral, including the Andalusi culture and the Reconquest.

**2026 GOALS**

Continue promoting social actions, particularly those aimed at contributing to wellbeing and equity, as well as improving the difficult circumstances faced by people at risk of social exclusion. At the same time, the creativity of visual artists from Murcia or living in the region will also be fostered. To this end, two separate calls will be launched. The Social Action Call, which serves as the basis for networked work with organisations with a strong social focus, aims to promote initiatives

designed to address the needs of the most disadvantaged people, encourage equal opportunities and full social inclusion. The Artistic Creation Projects Call offers Murcia-based creators the opportunity to exhibit their projects at the Fundación Cajamurcia headquarters, the Centro Cultural Las Claras, an exhibition space located in the city centre where architecture and heritage context engage in dialogue with contemporary creation.

In 2025, Fundación Caja Navarra reinforced its commitment to social innovation through its centres and the development of inclusive programmes aimed at addressing Navarra's social and cultural challenges. Key initiatives focused on improving the quality of life and autonomy of people with disabilities, as well as strengthening programmes for older people and vulnerable groups. In the cultural field, CIVICAN consolidated its programme as a space for thought, participation and access to culture for diverse audiences. The Foundation also made progress in collaboration with social and cultural organisations across the region, promoting joint projects with real impact. During the year, monitoring and evaluation systems were strengthened, incorporating indicators that allow for a more precise assessment of results achieved. All of this contributed to consolidating its role as an organisation committed to sustainable social and cultural development in Navarra.

2026 GOALS

In 2026, Fundación Caja Navarra will advance the implementation of its 2025–2028 Strategic Plan with key projects for the institution and the region.

A highlight is the launch of the Humanae social innovation centre, aimed at generating solutions to emerging social challenges, as well as the commemoration of the 60th anniversary of Isterria, reinforcing its commitment to disability, autonomy and education. The Foundation will also roll out the Nuevas Longevidades project, focused on promoting an active

and positive perspective on ageing and developing initiatives adapted to this social reality. CIVICAN, the organisation's cultural centre, will continue to strengthen its position as a cultural driver, promoting critical thinking, participation and social cohesion.

At the same time, institutional positioning and territorial presence will be strengthened through strategic alliances and collaborative projects, alongside improvements in management and evaluation systems to ensure responsible and sustainable action.

### 2025 Main Milestones

Fundación Caja Rioja promoted the Biblioteca Nómada (Nomadic Library), a service designed to bring reading closer to rural areas through book lending and reading promotion activities. Through fortnightly routes, this mobile library has, since spring 2025, reached ten localities that do not have a public library service, covering a total population of 6,738 people, of whom 3,144 are women and 871 are children under 16.

The service offers a wide collection of books, magazines and educational materials for all ages. It brings culture and knowledge closer to rural or remote communities, encouraging reading habits and supporting the educational development of each locality. In addition, it provides tools to encourage children and young people to spend their leisure time reading.

The Biblioteca Nómada also runs a variety of workshops for Rural Cluster Schools, a total of 65 in 2025. It currently has more than 2,300 users.

### 2026 GOALS

2026 marks the launch of the 2026–2028 Strategic Plan, an ambitious roadmap that will lead Fundación Caja Rioja to consolidate its position as the leading private cultural reference organisation and the foremost body in the fight against depopulation in the region.

It will do so by strengthening the programming of its six cultural centres and cultural accessibility initiatives such as Aprender, Biblioteca Nómada and Divulgaciencia, a programme for the dissemination of science and technology that celebrates its 20th anniversary in 2026. Two decades of promoting scientific vocations and bringing science and technology closer to society.

At the same time, it will continue working in close contact with the primary sector, consolidating the major rural events of La Rioja: the La Rioja Agricultural Competition, the La Rioja Wine Competition, the Mildew Awards, the Villoslada Livestock Fair and the Santo Domingo Camino Market, where attention is placed on the primary sector, its strengths and its importance for the region's economy, society and culture.

In the socio-educational field, the Re-Creo mi Ciudad agreement stood out, an initiative promoted together with the City Council of Burgos to transform school playgrounds into open spaces for learning and coexistence, fostering inclusion, creativity and community participation through cultural, sporting and environmental activities, based on academic research in the fields of education and neuroscience.

In the cultural field, Órbita Creativa stood out, a project aimed at fostering cultural innovation through the creation of a community of artists who collaborate with institutions and educational centres, encouraging experimentation and the development of creative projects in dialogue with the territory and citizens.

These initiatives strengthened the Foundation's role as a driving force for the development of Burgos, based on collaboration with local entities and open access to culture, knowledge and development.

**2026 GOALS**

In 2026, the following initiatives stand out:

Petronila. Burgos Film Festival, whose first edition will take place in February, featuring screenings, professional meetings and educational activities. Focused on socially engaged cinema, it will include competitive sections and public-facing activities aimed at encouraging reflection, participation and the visibility of underrepresented realities.

In the environmental field, the programmes "Grandes árboles, grandes historias" will be developed, dedicated to the conservation of arboreal heritage and the memory associated with the trees of the province,

and "Conversar para conservar", a series of dialogues between experts offering diverse perspectives on conservation.

In addition, new social programmes will be launched, including AceRVo, based on immersive virtual reality experiences to improve the wellbeing of people with limited access, and Nido, the Foundation's family programme, along with the outreach podcast Conexión Círculo. Furthermore, construction will begin on a housing block intended for social rental.

The 11th edition of the “MusicVeu Solidarity Festival” stands out, bringing together efforts to promote accessible and solidarity-based culture, as well as the “Cultura amb Ànima” series, which promotes participatory, inclusive performances with all benefits reinvested in society. Likewise, the “Biennal d’Art Jove de Catalunya - GLOPS-” has supported emerging talent through artistic residencies and high-level exhibitions. The relaunch of the “Young Piano Performers Competition”, now in its 50th edition, provided an excellent platform for learning and experience for future professionals, in the Classical and Jazz categories. The “Impuls pel Territori 2025” call enabled funding for projects run by local organisations, strengthening the associative network and social investment. Finally, the “volunteering platform” stands out as an open space for third-sector organisations, designed to promote volunteering and altruistic, selfless social collaboration.

**2026 GOALS**

For 2026, the Foundation aims to consolidate a sustainable and measurable growth model, expanding territorial impact and public-private collaboration. MusicVeu Festival is expected to be strengthened as a leading charity festival, the volunteer network will be expanded, and new projects will be developed linked to social action and the care of older people and/or people with disabilities. At the same time, the educational and

opportunity dimension for young people will be enhanced through scholarships and mentoring programmes. In the cultural sphere, strategic projects linked to heritage and the commemoration of Gaudí 2026 Centenary will be promoted, reinforcing the territory’s positioning as a cultural benchmark. All of this will be guided by a model of responsible governance, financial transparency and continuous evaluation of social impact.

Highlights include the opening of the exhibition *De par en par*, dedicated to the Foundation's Documentary Archive, as well as the opening of the new access point to its Alicante headquarters, improving accessibility and the visitor experience. In the heritage field, work was carried out on the renewal of the Casa Museo Modernista in Novelda, the restoration of the modernist façade of Casa Cervantes in Cartagena, and the project to rehabilitate Hort del Xocolater in Elche as a cultural centre. In the artistic sphere, the Art Collection Gatherings exhibition was held at the IVAM CADA Alcoy. In addition, the Foundation consolidated its major ongoing programmes —Flamenco, Jazz, Classical Music, lectures, literary competitions and the 48th Elche Film Festival— broadening audiences and participation.

**2026 GOALS**

In 2026, Fundación Mediterráneo will consolidate its cultural programming model, reinforcing strategic cycles and spaces for reflection linked to historically and artistically significant anniversaries. It will make decisive progress in enhancing its architectural heritage, completing ongoing rehabilitation projects and modernising exhibition and museum spaces to improve sustainability and accessibility. It will also promote the digitisation and dissemination of the Fundación Mediterráneo Archive, strengthening its research profile and paying special attention to the 50th anniversary of the death of Óscar Esplá,

whose memory and legacy will be the focus of a dedicated programme. In the artistic field, the national profile of the Contemporary Art Collection will be expanded and partnerships with cultural and academic institutions will be strengthened. Likewise, major ongoing programmes — cinema, music and, notably, the Festival Flamenco Mediterráneo on its tenth anniversary — will be reinforced, alongside the development of educational and cultural mediation projects aimed at new audiences.

Three days featuring a free programme of round tables, workshops, guided visits and activities, highlighting its cross-cutting identity and its link with the public.

It also hosted La Casa de los Cuidados, a series of sessions dedicated to reflecting on community care. Through meetings and participatory activities, the importance of strengthening neighbourhood networks and promoting collective responsibility in response to vulnerability and everyday needs was addressed.

**2026 GOALS**

Fundación Montemadrid will continue driving transformative change in society, fostering an active and critical citizenry through its programmes focused on inclusive, high-quality education that ensures equal opportunities, cultural dissemination and creation, committed social action—especially with the most disadvantaged groups—critical thinking, and engagement with sustainability and

In 2025, FUNDOS marked its 10th anniversary with a wide-ranging institutional programme of activities. The main milestone was the completion of the refurbishment and adaptation of FUNDOS Estudio, a cultural heritage logistics centre in León. This pioneering infrastructure is dedicated to the conservation, research and management of a collection of more than 13,000 items and documentary holdings, with specialised spaces and advanced technology.

The organisation also launched FUNDOS School, a business school that began its activity with its first two executive programmes.

During the year, the organising committees were also established for the two major cultural projects scheduled for 2026: the centenary of the death of Antoni Gaudí, declared an Event of Exceptional Public Interest, and the fiftieth anniversary of the art critic and historian Juan Antonio Gaya Nuño.

**2026 GOALS**

In 2026, FUNDOS will focus its activity on consolidating its role as a leading cultural and social institution in Castilla y León. Among its main objectives is the effective launch of FUNDOS Estudio, a cultural heritage logistics centre dedicated to the conservation, research and digitisation of collections. In addition, the Gaudí Plan 2026 will be developed, an international programme marking the centenary of the architect's death, which will strengthen the profile of the Museo Casa Botines Gaudí through exhibitions, research and educational activities.

The plan also includes the renewal of the permanent exhibition at the Museo Casa Botines Gaudí, the strengthening of cultural programming across the Foundation's centres, and the drafting of the 2026-2030 Culture and Heritage Master Plan.

At the same time, improvements will be driven in governance, digitisation, fundraising and talent management, with the aim of consolidating an efficient, transparent institutional model focused on social impact.

ARKABIA has been designed as an open and vibrant center to host educational exhibitions with a variety of themes and formats, including guided tours, family workshops, concerts, film screenings, and theatrical performances, among other activities. It will showcase the wide range of cultural activities organized by Fundación Vital, as well as third-party events, right in the heart of the capital of Álava.

Another important milestone was the commemoration of the 175th anniversary of the founding of the Municipal Savings Bank of Vitoria, the first in the Basque Country and in the State, with the participation of a local council. Social, cultural, business, economic and institutional representatives of Álava paid tribute to the service work that the Foundation continues to carry out.

**2026 GOALS**

In 2026, Fundación Vital intends to develop ARKABIA's new Cultural Agenda to achieve the goal of becoming a leading cultural hub in the city of Vitoria-Gasteiz and the Historical Territory of Álava. Another top priority is to continue working to improve the inclusion of people in all areas and to use education and training as tools for improving society.

The physical and mental well-being of all people is another of the aspirations on

which the Foundation bases its work and which it shares with the associative world with which it collaborates closely. For this reason, it will maintain its function of serving as a link between institutions, organisations and our community, responding to requests for new projects submitted to us throughout the year and promoting initiatives aimed at addressing needs, in order to further deepen our commitment to the Alava community.

Through our Foundation, in 2025 particular emphasis was placed on the training and labour market integration of young people, increasing both the number and scope of agreements with the Universidad Politècnica de València, with which a design and digital printing classroom is maintained, in addition to participating in all employment forums at other universities. Agreements with sports teams from various disciplines have been strengthened. Through their grassroots academies, these partnerships promote the idea that practising sport provides educational and social values, fosters teamwork, communication, tolerance, respect and discipline, and develops social and emotional skills from an early age. In addition, a sustainability classroom has been launched, also with the Universidad Politècnica de València, at its Alcoy campus, for the research and development of training, awareness and outreach initiatives on sustainability across all possible areas.

**2026 GOALS**

The main projects for 2026 include, on the one hand, the implementation of the Veterinary Medicine degree at the Ontinyent Campus, for which the necessary procedures and actions have been launched in collaboration with the university itself and the City Council of Ontinyent. The project involves an estimated investment of 70 million euros and approximately 14,000 m<sup>2</sup>, including lecture halls, laboratories, a simulation centre and a Veterinary Clinical Hospital operating 365 days a year. This initiative will position Ontinyent as an academic and

veterinary benchmark, attracting students, boosting local economic development and improving veterinary services in the area. Elsewhere, within the music education programme, a new stage of growth, professionalisation and expansion begins for the Orquesta Caixa Ontinyent as a training project, promoting academic excellence, the education of young musicians, creating synergies with educational institutions and offering new employment opportunities in the music sector.

During 2025, the Obra Social of Colonya supported 468 activities carried out in the Balearic Islands, awarding grants totalling more than one million euros. This action reflects our firm commitment to the associative fabric and to a model of social, cultural and environmental development rooted in the territory.

Throughout the year, we have collaborated with organisations that promote culture, strengthen education, support older people and improve the living conditions of the most vulnerable groups. We have also promoted grassroots sport as a space for values-based learning and inclusion, and supported sustainability and environmental care initiatives.

More than a one-time action, this work constitutes the central pillar of our social responsibility and our identity as a local financial institution.

**2026 GOALS**

For 2026, the main objectives of Colonya Foundation Obra Social focus on consolidating a model aligned with the principles of ethical banking promoted through Estalvi Ètic, strengthening the social and environmental impact of supported projects across the Balearic Islands. In the social care field, priority will be given to initiatives aimed at vulnerable groups, contributing to reducing poverty and social exclusion. In the cultural and educational area, support will continue for

projects that promote access to knowledge and culture as tools for social transformation. In the sports field, support for school and grassroots sport will be maintained as a space for values education and inclusion.

One of the strategic challenges for 2026 is to advance in impact measurement, strengthen partnerships with the third sector, and integrate sustainability criteria across all lines of action.

**2025 Main Milestones**

In 2025, three particularly significant studies stand out. The journal **“Panorama Social No. 41: ‘From children of immigrants to social protagonists: The second generation in Spain’”** analyses the educational, labour, social and political integration of this group, which already accounts for more than 20% of the underage population, highlighting significant progress alongside persistent inequalities depending on origin and family background. The book **“The economics of infrastructure in Spain: reality, challenges and recommendations”** provides a comprehensive economic analysis of the planning, financing and sustainability of key infrastructure—water, transport, telecommunications and energy— and puts forward proposals to improve the efficiency and coherence of public policies. Meanwhile, **“Cost of regulation and competitiveness in the banking sector: analysis of the Spanish case”** examines the impact of the increasing regulatory burden on the competitiveness of the financial sector, placing it within the European debate and proposing improvements in regulation and supervision.

**2026 GOALS**

Funcas will strengthen its leadership in macroeconomic forecasting for Spain in 2026, expanding its European reach through the Funcas Europe programme. Its priorities will include studies on the housing market, infrastructure, the management of Next Generation EU funds and the monitoring of geopolitical risks.

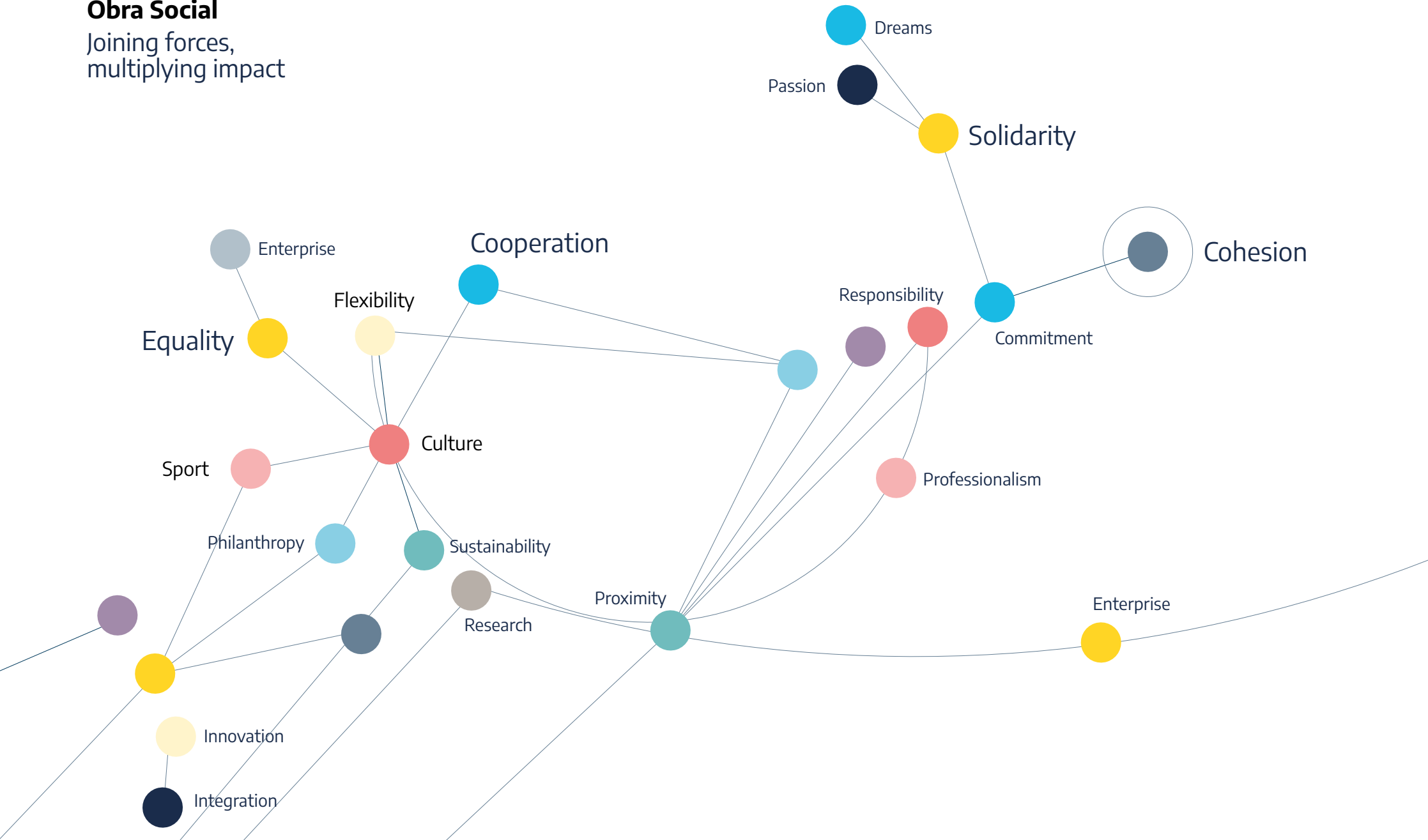
